**EASTERN WHITE PINE:**



Soft, light green blue needles, tolerates dry, rocky soil as well as wet, swampy areas. Excellent ornamental for windbreaks, Christmas trees, small properties. Fast grower. Good for naturalizing and windbreaks.

**BLACK HILLS SPRUCE:**

Slow growth to 40 feet, short, stiff bluish-green needles, dense evergreen screen that won't grow out of control. Provides excellent shelter for wildlife and an excellent farmstead windbreak. Also an excellent subject for Bonsai hobbyists. Grows in ordinary soil.



**DOUGLAS FIR:**



One of the most popular Christmas trees with soft, blue green needles that hold well. Grows best in moist, well-drained soils; can reach 60 ft. in height with a spread of 15-25 ft. Won't do well in heavy, wet, clay soils.

**ENTERPRISE APPLE:**

Late-maturing, deep red apple with good keeping qualities. Fruit is uniform and medium to large in size. Tree is vigorous and spreading, with good annual bearing habits. Enterprise is highly resistant to fire blight and cedar apple rust.



**CRIMSON CRISP:**



Medium in size with a very attractive red color, firm, crisp texture, tart fruit. Grower friendly, matures in mid-season. Will keep in cold storage for 6 months.

**BARTLETT PEAR:**

Excellent quality, one of the choicest canning varieties. Requires cross-pollination, planting more than one is recommended. Ripens in late August.



**AMERICAN CHESTNUT HYBRID:**



Fast growing, reaching a height of 80-100 feet. Although male and female flowers can be produced on the same tree, they need another American Chestnut for good pollination, plant a minimum of 2 trees. They should start producing sweet edible nuts in 13 to 15 years.

**AMERICAN HAZELNUT:**

Multi-stemmed small growing tree 10-15 feet in height. Edible nuts mature September to October.



**SHADBLOW SERVICEBERRY:**



Also known as Juneberry. Height 25-30 feet. Blooms in early spring. Berrylike edible fruits in summer are maroon-red and quite attractive to birds.

**AMERICAN COMMON PERSIMMON:**

A native tree 25 to 40 feet in height and 20 to 35 feet in width. Common Persimmon is slender with an oval-rounded crown, often very symmetrical, white, fragrant flowers are very sweet and a favorite of honeybees. An edible persimmon ripens with a deep orange color after several frosts. More than one tree is needed for pollination to produce fruit. Persimmon tends to sucker into groves or colonies, producing food for wildlife. The hard, heavy, close-grained wood is used for golf club heads, billiard cues, and flooring.



**RED OAK:**



Fast growing to 60-70 feet with equal spread, grows best in sandy to rich loamy soil in full sun. Very valuable as a timber tree.

**NANNYBERRY VIBURNUM:**

Medium growth 15 – 18 ft. but can reach a height of 30 ft. with a spread of 6 to 10 ft., flat clusters of white flowers in late May, with purplish-black berries in fall and winter that make good winter food for birds. Leaves turn a lovely purplish-red in fall. This plant is good for wetlands.



**SILKY DOGWOOD:**



Fast growing up to 9 feet. Grows best in well drained moist soil. Very good for soil erosion on banks. Berries are attractive to birds.

**NORTHEAST NATIVE WILDFLOWER & GRASS MIX:**

A showy mix of native grasses & wildflowers. Major species includes; sideoats grama, little bluestem, virginia wildrye, purple coneflower, blackeyed susan, oxeye sunflower, and aster. Majority of mix reaches 3-5 ft. annually. For a full species composition list contact the District.



**WILDLIFE FOOD PLOT MIX:**



Provides habitat and food for a variety of wildlife. Mix includes; milo, millet, buckwheat, and sunflower. Attractive to mourning doves, turkey, and deer. Remains standing in winter to provide shelter and an emergency food source. Seed in May or June.
