EASTERN WHITE PINE:

Soft, light green blue needles, tolerates dry, rocky soil as well as wet, swampy areas. Excellent ornamental for specimen tree, naturalizing, and windbreaks. Fast grower. Can be used

for Christmas trees and timber.

DOUGLAS FIR:

One of the most popular Christmas trees with soft, blue green needles that hold well. Grows best in moist, well-drained soils; can reach 60' in height with a spread of 15-25'. Won't do well in heavy, wet, clay soils. This



particular strain is highly resistant to gypsy moth.

WHITE SPRUCE:

EVERGREENS (bundles of 10)



Grows to 50' with light bluishgreen needles usually less than an inch in length. It thrives in well drained or moist soils. Tolerates heat and drought better than others and is extremely hardy.

APPLE TREE BUNDLE (1 of EACH):

SMOKEHOUSE APPLE:

An old timer welcomed in every home and is a favorite for pies and applesauce. Ripens in September and keeps well in common storage late into the winter months. Dwarf: 10'



HONEYCRISP APPLE:



The fruit is mostly orange-red with a yellow background. This crisp, juicy, sweet apple has a rich flavor that has made it "#1" in taste panels. The fruit averages 3 inches

and up, matures ten days before Red Delicious and stores well. Outstanding winter hardiness gives this variety excellent potential for northern growing regions. Honeycrisp is moderately resistant to apple scab and fire blight. Semi-dwarf: 10-20'

RED WINESAP APPLE:

An improved all red Winesap. Firm fruit that is medium in size used for eating fresh or making apple butter or pies. Matures late October. Dwarf: 10'



GLENGLO PEACH:

Early season variety rapidly becoming very popular in the Mid-Atlantic region. Many people consider this peach the best flavored peach of the



season. The tree is medium in vigor and is productive.

GLOWINGSTAR PEACH:



A medium to large freestone peach developed in Michigan that has excellent color and firmness. Trees are very winter hardy, productive and tolerant to

bacterial spot.

WHITE OAK:



Grows 50-80' in height and width. Grows best in deep, loamy well drained soil. The most prolific lumber tree in the Northern Hemisphere. Has a good tolerance for highway salt.

EASTERN REDBUD:

Grows 20-30' high and wide, flowers are reddish-purple in bud, then open to a rosypink with purple tinge in early spring. Very effective as a mass planting with dark green, heart shaped leaves



that reach 3 to 5" in length and spread.

WEEPING WILLOW (potted)

Mature height 30 – 40'. Long pendulous branches giving graceful appearance. Slender leaves; light green on top and gravish green beneath. Fast growing in wide variety of soils. Thrives



in wet areas, perfect along ponds or streams.

AMERICAN COMMON PERSIMMON:



A native tree 25 to 40' high. Persimmon is slender with an ovalrounded crown, often very symmetrical. White, fragrant flowers are a favorite of honeybees. Edible persimmon ripens with a

deep orange color after several frosts. More than one tree is needed for pollination to produce fruit. Persimmon tends to sucker into groves or colonies, producing food for wildlife.

DECIDUOUS TREES (potted)

WILDFLOWER & FOOD PLOT

CHOKECHERRY:

Fast growing, can reach 20 to 30' high and 18 to 25' wide. May be used as a small suckering tree or large shrub forming an oval rounded crown. Fruit is red to dark purple, good for making jams and jellies, as well as providing food and shelter for wildlife.



ARROWWOOD VIBURNUM:



Vigorous grower to 15' high with a spread of 6-15'. Flat clusters of creamy white flowers in early June. Attractive bluish-black berries are very showy against the glossy red fall foliage. Excellent wildlife habitat as the birds relish the fruits and foliage seeds.

SHOWY NE WILDFLOWER & GRASS MIX:

A showy mix of native grasses & wildflowers. Major species includes; sideoats grama, little bluestem, virginia wildrye, purple coneflower, blackeyed susan, oxeye sunflower, and aster.



Majority of mix reaches 3-5' annually. For full species composition contact the District.

LOW GROW WILDFLOWER & GRASS MIX



Designed for erosion and sediment control and color on low fertility sights. After establishment mow annually in spring, prior to new growth. Typical height is 3'. For full species composition contact the District.

WILDLIFE FOOD PLOT MIX:



Provides habitat and food for a variety of wildlife. Mix includes; milo, millet, buckwheat, and sunflower. Attractive to mourning doves, turkey, and deer. Remains standing in winter to provide shelter and an emergency

food source. Seed in May or June.

5' TREE TUBE:

5' vented tree shelter. Provides protection from predators, wind, and chemical sprays. Promotes seedling growth. Attaches to stake with nylon ratchet ties.



2' SHRUB TUBE:



Provides protection from predators, wind, and chemical sprays. Promotes seedling growth. Attaches to stake with nylon ratchet ties. 2' high and approximately 5-6" in diameter.

5' OAK STAKE:

5' hardwood oak stake for anchoring tree and shrub shelters. Stakes are 1 inch thick with pointed end.

5' FIBERGLASS STAKE:

5' fiberglass stake for anchoring tree and shrub shelters.
